MUSIC NOTES

Sir Edward Bairstow was appointed organist of York Minster in 1913, a post he held until his death; in addition, he became Professor of Music at Durham University in 1929, where his pupils included Gerald Finzi and Francis Jackson (his successor at the Minster). "Lord, Thou Hast Been Our Refuge" was commissioned for the 263rd Festival of the Sons of the Clergy in 1917, held at St. Paul's Cathedral, London. Dramatic to the core, the work is full of glorious melodies and colorful harmonies; written in the darkest days of war-torn Britain, its tone is at once hopeful and wistful.

Born into a musical family—his father was the composer Samuel Wesley and his grandfather the Methodist leader and hymn writer Charles Wesley—Samuel Sebastian Wesley was one of the outstanding musicians of nineteenth-century England. He was a chorister at the Chapel Royal, St. James's Palace, London, and was successively organist of the cathedrals of Hereford, Exeter, Winchester, and Gloucester. His large-scale anthem *Ascribe unto the Lord* ends with the sublime "The Lord Hath Been Mindful of Us" which is excerpted this morning.

Today's prelude is the last movement of Bairstow's Organ Sonata. Fugal in compositional form, it is an example of Bairstow's proclivity for learned counterpoint.

The postlude is the joyous final movement of Samuel Wesley's Duet for Organ, in which the fugue subject is passed across the entire range of the instrument and between the hands and feet of the two organists.
