WELCOME

Today is the Fourth Sunday in Lent. The preacher is the Reverend Ray Hammond '71, M.D. '75, A.M. '84, the founder and pastor of Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Boston and co-founder of Ten Point Coalition. The service is led by Professor Stephanie Paulsell, Interim Pusey Minister in the Memorial Church, Susan Shallcross Swartz Professor of the Practice of Christian Studies, Harvard Divinity School; the Reverend Alanna C. Sullivan, Associate Minister in the Memorial Church; and the Reverend Westley P. Conn, Ministry Fellow in the Memorial Church. You will also hear the voices of some of the family members and friends with whom we are sheltering and for whose help with the liturgy we are most grateful. The first lesson is read by Lauren Church '21, Student Deacon, Student Advisory Board. The second lesson is read by Jeromel Dela Rosa Lara '23, Student Deacon, Student Advisory Board. The music for this Sunday's service is provided by Edward Elwyn Jones, Gund University Organist and Choirmaster. The offertory and anthem are taken from archival recordings of the Harvard University Choir. The prelude and postlude this morning were recorded on the organ at First-Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska this past week by David von Behren, Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster.

MUSIC NOTES

Moses Hogan was a gifted concert pianist, conductor, and founder of the Moses Hogan Chorale; he died at a tragically young age in 2003. He is most widely remembered for his contemporary settings of spirituals: "We Shall Walk Through the Valley in Peace" and "Lord, I Want to Be a Christian" are two of his most powerful arrangements.

Of all of Johann Sebastian Bach's sons, Carl Philipp Emanuel was the most renowned during his lifetime. Godson of Georg Philipp Telemann, he studied law at the University of Leipzig, while at the same time assisting his father musically. In 1738, the Prussian crown prince Frederick offered Emanuel a post as harpsichordist to the royal chamber. "Aus der Tiefe rufe ich" (Out of the depths I call, Lord, to you) bears the J. S. Bach catalog number of BWV 745 because it was historically attributed to Johann Sebastian, but it is now believed to have been written by Emanuel. Based on the 16th century Passion hymn, "O Mensch, bewein dein Sünde gross" (O man, bewail thy sin so great), BWV 622 comes from J. S. Bach's *Orgelbüchlein* collection, a set of 46 organ chorale preludes for the different liturgical seasons of the church year.

Next Sunday is the Fifth Sunday in Lent. The preacher will be the Reverend Alanna C. Sullivan, Associate Minister in the Memorial Church.


