PEACEFUL PIPES ORGAN MUSIC SERIES

This Wednesday, September 6, Carson Cooman will perform contemplative and meditative organ music by Andreas Willscher and the premiere of Cooman's own *Three Autumn Sketches* in Appleton Chapel at 12:15 p.m.

THE OFFICE OF COMPLINE

This Thursday, September 7, at 9 p.m., compline, a twenty-minute candlelit evening service will be sung by the Harvard University Choir, based upon the traditional evening liturgy of scripture, music, prayers, and silence. Weather permitting, this service will be held on the steps of the church facing Tercentenary Theatre.

MUSIC NOTES

To mark the opening of term, we welcome the voices of candidates for membership in the Harvard University Choir—as well as returning Sunday Choir members—to sing two jubilant choral works. Harvard College graduate Carson Cooman '04 is Composer-in-Residence at the Memorial Church, which has witnessed the premieres of many of his works. His perky setting of Psalm 66 was commissioned by the choir of Battell Chapel at Yale University, and was premiered on Easter Day 2005.

Adrian Batten is thought to have been a chorister at Winchester Cathedral—his name is still legible today, carved into the wall of its chantry—before serving in both Westminster Abbey and St. Paul's Cathedral, London. The clarity of texture and directness of expression found in “O Sing Joyfully” are characteristics typical of English church music of the Tudor period.

The prelude this morning, also written by Carson Cooman, is a three-movement suite written for ceremonial occasions, the final movement of which uses two organ divisions antiphonally. Sharing its title, today's postlude was written by the celebrated Parisian teacher and composer Eugène Gigout (whose pupils included Gabriel Fauré), originally written with a similar use of the divisions in mind—this morning it will be played by both our organs (and organists)!
