$\frac{\text{MORNING PRAYERS NEW START TIME OF 8:30 A.M.}}{\text{BEGINNING TOMORROW}}$

With the recent implementation of a new course schedule by the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, which has both united and impacted the entire Harvard community, the Memorial Church of Harvard University is changing the daily schedule for Morning Prayers.

Historically, the service of Morning Prayers, which has been kept at Harvard since its founding in 1636, was scheduled at the beginning of the day before classes began to allow students to start their day with prayer and contemplation. In order to welcome all to partake in the daily service going forward, the Memorial Church must also adjust to the changing demands of the University.

As such, the service of Morning Prayers will begin 15 minutes earlier each weekday starting tomorrow, October 1, 2018. The new service time will be 8:30–8:45 a.m., Monday–Friday in term, in Appleton Chapel.

The end of the seven-minute passing period, known as "Harvard Time," began with the new academic year on September 4, and classes now begin promptly at 9:00 a.m. The shift in schedule to an earlier start time will allow our Choral Fellows, students, faculty, and staff to arrive at classes on time.

LUNCHTIME ORGAN MUSIC SERIES

This Wednesday, a program of organ music will be offered at 12:15 p.m. by Barry Rose, formerly of Guildford Cathedral; St. Paul's Cathedral, London; and St. Albans Cathedral.

THE OFFICE OF COMPLINE

This Thursday, compline, a twenty-minute candlelit evening service, will be sung by the Harvard University Choir, based upon the traditional evening liturgy of scripture, music, prayers, and silence. The service will be held in Appleton Chapel at 9 p.m.

CHORAL EVENSONG

Next Sunday, a service of Choral Evensong at 3:00 p.m. will be offered by the Harvard University Choir under the direction of Barry Rose, featuring works by Rose, Leighton, and Parry.

MUSIC NOTES

There are few musical forms that have endured and flourished as the motet, which has been in continuous existence since the twelfth century. Johann Sebastian Bach's essays in the genre are pinnacles of the choral literature; indeed of all Bach's vocal works, the motets are the only category that continued in an unbroken tradition of performance from the composer's time to the present day.

This morning, the Harvard University Choir presents selections from the earliest, longest, and most complex of Bach's motets, *Jesu, meine Freude*, BWV 227, written around 1723 for the funeral of Johanna Maria Käsin, the wife of Leipzig's postmaster. Scored for fivepart chorus (SSATB), the motet is based on a chorale that first appeared in 1653 (text by Johann Franck, music by Johann Crüger); it also uses words from St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans. An architectural symmetry permeates the whole, centered around No. 6, "Ihr aber seid nicht fleischlich," which contrasts the earthly with the spiritual; the most theatrical movement, No. 5, "Trotz dem alten Drachen," pits medieval dragon imagery (a thinly-veiled reference to the Catholic Church) with the steadfast, brave faith of Luther.

Dating from the early 1700s—when Bach was engaging in a thorough study of the French style—the *Pièce d'orgue* is unique in the composer's œuvre. Tripartite in structure, a central, stately *Gravement*—written in a five-part texture and featuring ongoing deceptive cadences and rich chromatic harmonies—is not unlike the *Grand jeu* of French composers such as Nicolas de Grigny. This section is enclosed by an opening toccata of appoggiaturas and an epilogue of florid broken chords with acciaccaturas.

Nicolaus Bruhns was a Danish-German organist, violinist, and composer who wrote in the North German *stylus fantasticus*, which is marked by an alternation between free, improvisatory sections and more formally controlled fugal sections.

On Saturday, October 20, at 7:30 p.m., the Harvard University Choir and Grand Harmonie will present Gluck's opera *Alceste* (1776) with professional soloists.
