

#### WELCOME

Today is the First Sunday after the Epiphany, Baptism of Our Lord. The preacher is the Reverend Westley P. Conn, Ministry Fellow in the Memorial Church. The service is led by the Reverend Alanna C. Sullivan, Associate Minister in the Memorial Church. You will also hear the voices of some of the family members and friends with whom we are sheltering and for whose help with the liturgy we are most grateful. The first lesson is read by Babita Kuruvilla. The second lesson is read by Linda Kennedy ALM '22. The music for this Sunday's service is provided by Edward Elwyn Jones, Gund University Organist and Choirmaster. The offertory and anthem are taken from archival recordings of the Harvard University Choir. The prelude and postlude this morning were recorded on the organ at First-Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska this past week by David von Behren, Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster.

## **MUSIC NOTES**

John Gardner was a prolific British musician: during his varied career he was a *repetiteur* at Covent Garden, a Professor at the Royal Academy of Music, and the Director of Music at St. Paul's Girls' School, London. *Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day* was written for the pupils of St. Paul's and has become his most famous anthem; the fourth verse—concerning the baptism of Christ—makes it particularly appropriate for use today.

Jonathan Dove is one of Britain's leading composers and is particularly associated with vocal music, both for the stage and for the church. *The Three Kings* was written for the choir of King's College, Cambridge, and sets words by Dorothy L. Sayers. Best-known for her detective fiction, Sayers considered her finest work to be her translation of Dante and her Christian writings. The poem is a colorful and evocative portrayal of the Magi, and Dove responds with a suitably mystical and exotic setting.

The French composer Maurice Duruflé spent his whole career as Professor of Harmony at the Paris Conservatory and as organist at the church of St-Étienne-du-Mont. His very small number of musical compositions are highly regarded for their distinctive style and technical mastery and have nearly all entered the standard organ and choral repertoire. Today's prelude is based on the Gregorian plainchant introit for Epiphany: "Ecce advenit dominator Dominus" ("Behold the Lord comes, and kingdom, power, and dominion are in his hand"). The sprightly accompaniment to the chant melody perhaps depicts the Magi's arrival, following the star. Richard Purvis is best-known for his tenure as Director of Music at San Francisco's Grace Cathedral, a position he held from 1947 until his retirement in 1971. His more than 200 compositions were unusual at the time for their whole-hearted embrace of a warm romantic style that was then out of favor in both church and concert music circles.
