
All are welcome to share in the Lord's Supper without regard to denomination.

#### **REOPENING CONCERT**

A concert of choral cycles and organ concerti by American composers Howard Hanson; Chris DeBlasio; Alfred V. Fedak; and Carson P. Cooman '04, composer in residence in the Memorial Church, will be held this afternoon at 4:00 p.m. in the Memorial Church Sanctuary. Admission is free. The concert will feature the University Choir and orchestra.

#### MUSIC NOTES

Herbert Howells was born in Gloucestershire, England, and studied with Charles Stanford and Charles Wood at the Royal College of Music. He was the most important English composer of the generation to succeed Elgar, Vaughan Williams, and Holst, and his contribution to the renaissance of English choral music in the twentieth century is unparalleled. In 1941 Howells was appointed Acting Organist of St. John's College, Cambridge, and in 1943 he composed his famous morning and evening Canticles for King's College, Cambridge (the *Collegium Regale* service). In 1956 Howells revisited the themes of this now-classic work in his Holy Communion service which once again displays the composer's natural aptitude for counterpoint, and his flair for sheer beauty of vocal harmony; this morning the Harvard University Choir presents the elegiac *Kyrie* and the haunting *Agnus Dei*.

Thomas Attwood was a chorister at the Chapel Royal and subsequently studied with Mozart in Vienna; *Turn Thy Face from My Sins* is a setting of words from Psalm 51, appropriate for the beginning of the Lenten journey.

Today's organ music comes from Bach's monumental keyboard study (or *Clavierübung*), the third part of which is devoted to organ music. Each setting utilizes a plainsong melody adapted from an early Lutheran hymnbook; the poignant *Kyrie* presents the theme in the treble voice, while the elegant *Christe* utilizes the sonorous tenor register. The postlude,

*Kyrie, Gott heiliger Geist*, is written in a deliberately archaic style—one that Bach often refers to in his large-scale liturgical settings—in which the melody is heard in long notes in the pedals.
