# **MUSIC NOTES**

Johannes Brahms's *Ein deutsches Requiem* (A German Requiem) was written between 1865 and 1868 and was the work that first established the young composer's reputation. The death of Brahms's mother in 1865 was the probable impetus for the work, which received its premiere under the direction of composer and conductor Carl Reinecke. Brahms assembled the texts himself, using selections from the German Lutheran Bible, with the intention of providing a Requiem to comfort the living, not one for the repose of the souls of the dead. "Wie lieblich sind deine Wohnungen" is the work's central movement—a serene, pastoral setting of Psalm 84.

The French composer Gabriel Fauré became director of the Paris Conservatory in 1905, where his pupils included Maurice Ravel and Nadia Boulanger. One of his most popular works, the *Cantique de Jean Racine* was written during the composer's senior year of college, though it displays a mature understanding of harmony and counterpoint. The text is Racine's seventeenth-century translation of the Gregorian hymn *Consors paterni luminis*.

Fauré's beloved *Pavane* was written in the late 1880s for piano but found fame in its revised version for orchestra and optional chorus. Taking its rhythm from the slow, processional Spanish court dance, Fauré's work would be imitated by his juniors Debussy and Ravel, who went onto compose famous versions of the dance. Charles-Marie Widor was a contemporary of Fauré and worked as organist at the Church of Saint-Sulpice in Paris, only about a half-hour walk from where Fauré was concurrently the organist of La Madeleine. Today's postlude is the joyous and rambunctious Finale from Widor's sixth organ symphony.

# ORGAN RECITAL

Thomas Sheehan, Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster, will perform an organ recital this afternoon at 4 p.m. in the Memorial Church. Utilizing both the Skinner and Fisk organs, the program will feature works by Buxtehude, Padre Davide da Bergamo, Debussy, Dynam-Victor Fumet, Karg-Elert, Carson Cooman '04, Larry King, and Mendelssohn.
