

WELCOME

Today is the Sixth Sunday of Easter. The preacher is the Reverend Alanna C. Sullivan, Associate Minister in the Memorial Church. The service is led by Professor Stephanie Paulsell, Interim Pusey Minister in the Memorial Church, Susan Shallcross Swartz Professor of the Practice of Christian Studies, Harvard Divinity School, Professor Emmanuel K. Akyeampong, Minister of Formation and Worship in the Memorial Church, Ellen Gurney Professor of History and Professor of African and African American Studies, Oppenheimer Faculty Director of the Harvard University Center for African Studies, and the Reverend Westley P. Conn, Ministry Fellow in the Memorial Church. You will also hear the voices of some of the family members and friends with whom we are sheltering and for whose help with the liturgy we are most grateful. The first lesson is read by Angela Eichhorst '22, Member of the Harvard University Choir. The second lesson is read by Alex Grayson '22, Co-Lead Student Deacon in the Memorial Church. The music for this Sunday's service is provided by Edward Elwyn Jones, Gund University Organist and Choirmaster. Today's choral offerings are drawn from archival recordings of the Harvard University Choir. The prelude and postlude are from an archival recording by David von Behren, Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster.

MUSIC NOTES

Sir Charles Villiers Stanford studied at Cambridge University, and also in Leipzig and Berlin, where he was a pupil of Carl Reinecke. While in Germany, he became an ardent devotee of the music of Johannes Brahms, whose influence is felt throughout Stanford's oeuvre. Stanford was later organist of Trinity College, Cambridge: the *Three Latin Motets* were written as graces to be performed before meals on feast days in the Great Hall of that college. "Beati quorum via" is the lyrical second motet, which explores the various textural combinations of a six-part choir.

There are few musical forms that have endured and flourished as the motet, which has been in continuous existence since the twelfth century. Johann Sebastian Bach's examples in the genre are pinnacles of the choral literature; indeed, of all Bach's vocal works, the motets are the only category that continued in an unbroken tradition of performance from the composer's time to the present day. *Der Geist hilft unser Schwachheit auf*, BWV 226, was written for the funeral of the veteran headmaster of the Thomasschule (where Bach worked as a somewhat reluctant schoolmaster), Johann Heinrich Ernesti, which took place in the University Church of St. Paul on October 16, 1729. The motet is cast in three main sections: the text of the first two coming from the longest of the Pauline Epistles, Romans; the final section is the third strophe of Martin Luther's Pentecost chorale, "Komm, Heiliger Geist, Herre Gott." The work opens with a dancing, airy, melismatic figure that surrounds the listener with the comfort and aid of the Holy Spirit; Bach exploits the antiphonal possibilities of the double-choir formation to great dramatic effect.

"Denn wir wissen nicht" is appropriately portrayed through the staggered entrances of the choirs; the *affekt* changes on the words "sondern der Geist," where more angular and broken up lines represent the "unutterable sighs." The choirs unite for a confident and affirming fugue, "Der aber die Herzen," full of optimism and fortitude, and the work closes with Bach's gorgeous setting of Luther's chorale

This morning's prelude and postlude were recorded on the 1967 Hermann Hillebrand organ at United Church on the Green in New Haven, Connecticut. Most likely composed during his time in Weimar (1708–17), Bach's *Prelude and Fugue in D major*, BWV 532 illustrates the influence on his musical language from various national styles. The prelude is divided in three contrasting sections. With rhythmic motifs reminiscent of a French overture, the introduction draws also on the language of the North-German praeludium: bravura pedal and manual scales, an extended pedal point, and a double trill. Marked *alla breve*, the second section is more delicate and sprightly in nature with an Italianate character. The concluding section draws on the North German idiom of dense, rich harmonies. Based on a playful motif, the fugue is light-hearted in character; the repetitive subject modulates to remote key areas and back again, ending with a dramatic pedal cadenza.




NEXT SUNDAY'S SERVICE
