

WELCOME

Today is the Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost. The preacher is Professor Stephanie Paulsell, Interim Pusey Minister in the Memorial Church, Susan Shallcross Swartz Professor of the Practice of Christian Studies, Harvard Divinity School. The service is led by the Reverend Alanna C. Sullivan, Associate Minister in the Memorial Church and the Reverend Westley P. Conn, Ministry Fellow in the Memorial Church. You will also hear the voices of some of the family members and friends for whose help with the liturgy we are most grateful. The first lesson is read by Elizabeth Propst '22, Student Deacon, Student Advisory Board. The second lesson is read by Davis Bailey '22, Student Advisory Board. The music for this Sunday's service is provided by Edward Elwyn Jones, Gund University Organist and Choirmaster. The offertory and anthem are taken from archival service recordings of the Harvard University Choir. The prelude and postlude this morning were recorded on the organ at First-Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska this past week by David von Behren, Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster.

MUSIC NOTES

William Byrd was a prolific and versatile composer in virtually all contemporary English genres, and his music could be heard in the great cathedrals, in private chapels, at court, and in domestic amateur music-making. Indeed, the quality of his output even transcended the bitter religious divisions of the time, and his music was admired and performed by Protestants and Roman Catholics alike. "Praise Our Lord, All Ye Gentiles" comes from Byrd's final collection of published music, *Psalmes, Songs, and Sonnets* (1611). The four brief lines of Psalm 117 are fashioned into a substantial, joyful setting that incorporates a wide range of musical styles, from pure homophony to dense, active, six-part imitation.

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina's prolific and consistently superior output have made him one of the towering figures in Renaissance music. Although born in the nearby town of Palestrina, he spent his whole life in Rome; after training as a chorister in S. Maria Maggiore, he was appointed *Magister cappella* of the Cappella Giulia, the choir of St. Peter's Basilica. The double-choir *Magnificat Primi Toni* based on the first of the Magnificat tones—is homophonic in style but utilizes changing textures and colors through constant regroupings of the vocal forces, which only join together in full at certain key moments.

The Dutch composer Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck was one of the most significant transitional figures between the Renaissance and baroque era in the field of keyboard music. His variations are based on *Mein junges Leben hat ein End* (My young life has ended), a popular song of the time. The melody is varied with increasing elaborate textures.

One of the most significant German baroque composers before J. S. Bach, Dieterich Buxtehude's organ works represent the culmination of the seventeenth-century North German organ tradition. The postlude is, like today's anthem, also based on the first Magnificat plainsong tone. After an improvisatory introduction, eight sections follow, each based on a portion of the plainsong melody.
