Daniel Read and William Billings were two of the most important members of a group of self-taught composers who arose in New England during the period 1770–1820, now known as the First New England School. They created an indigenous sacred music readily accessible to all, which became instantly popular during that period of renewed religious fervor. Daniel Read's Windham—to a text by Isaac Watts—first appeared in 1785 in the collection The American Singing-Book.

William Billings wrote over 340 works, all for unaccompanied four-part chorus, many of which were used for teaching purposes in schools and churches throughout Boston. This morning's anthem, the poignant *When Jesus Wept*, is perhaps the most frequently republished work of the composer, first found in Billings's 1770 collection, *The New-England Psalm-Singer*.

Today's prelude is a set of variations on the popular American folk hymn *Wondrous Love* by Russell Schulz-Widmar, an important figure in American liturgical music who chaired the music committee for the Episcopal Hymnal 1982. The postlude is a setting of the popular South African hymn *Siyahamba* by Mark Miller, Professor of Church Music at Drew University, and Lecturer in the Practice of Sacred Music at Yale University.
